HE Greater Chennai Corporation (GCC) has rolled out a unique green initiative aimed at raising environmental awareness among city residents. Titled #LiveGreenLoveBlue, the campaign encourages citizens to hug trees, post pictures on social media, and tag the official GCC X handle, @chennaicorp. The move is part of a larger effort to promote greenery and water conservation in Chennai.

"This campaign is not just about hugging a tree; it's about reconnecting with nature and recognising the vital role trees play in sustaining our environment," said a GCC official.

The initiative has drawn mixed reactions from residents in areas like Mogappair and Anna Nagar, which are grappling with urban challenges like declining green cover and increasing pollution.

"I love the idea of the campaign. It's a fun and interactive way to remind people about the importance of trees," said Shruti Iyer, a resident of Mogappair West. "Our area has lost so much greenery due to rapid construction. This initiative



HE Tamil Nadu Pollution Control Board (TNPCB) recently imposed a penalty of ₹5.10 crore on the Tamil Nadu Cooperative Milk Producers Federation Limited (Aavin) for multiple environmental violations at its Ambattur dairy unit. The violations, including untreated effluent discharge and improper waste management, have drawn sharp criticism from environmental activists and residents.

The issue came to light following inspections by the TNPCB, which revealed that Aavin was processing up to 4.5 lakh litres of milk daily-well beyond its consented capacity of 3 lakh litres per day—without obtaining the necessary 'Consent to Operate' certification. Additionally, the Effluent Treatment Plant (ETP) at the Ambattur unit was either non-operational or functioning intermittently, exacerbating pollution concerns.

"The Korattur Lake has been choking due to years



of neglect, and now the actions of a government organization like Aavin are making it worse," said Ramesh Kanth, a member of a local environmental group. "How can they set an example when they themselves flout environmental regulations?"

In its report to the Southern Bench of the National Green Tribunal (NGT), the TNPCB stated that Aavin had failed to comply with several directives aimed at mitigating pollution. During inspections in November 2024, officials discovered heaps of unsegregated plastic and metal waste dumped

in the open near the ETP. This was in direct violation of the board's earlier directive to store plastic waste in a closed, secure area to

prevent wind dispersal. The NGT, hearing a case filed by the Korattur Lake Protecting People's

Movement, expressed concern over the continued pollution of Korattur Lake. The Bench, comprising Justice Pushpa Sathyanarayana and expert member Satyagopal Korlapati, stressed that Aavin must adhere to environmental regulations, especially as it serves as a public utility.

"Aavin should lead by example and ensure they comply with all environmental norms. The Korattur Lake is a shared resource, and its protection is not optional," said Narayan, a local resident and


environmental activist. The Bench directed the

TNPCB to submit a status report on Aavin's ETP by the next hearing. It also instructed an Aavin official to appear in person to explain the organisation's failure to address the violations.

The Korattur Lake Protecting People's Movement, which has been at the forefront of the fight to save the lake, welcomed the penalty as a step in the right direction but demanded stricter monitoring of Aavin's operations. "This is just the beginning. Accountability must be sustained, or we risk losing Korattur Lake entirely," said a member.

The case highlights the urgent need for stricter enforcement of environmental laws to protect Chennai's fragile ecosystems.

Avadi Cops crack down on gutka network

IN a major crackdown on sale of gutka and other banned tobacco products, the Avadi police seized more than 2,000kg of illegal items and arrested four people on Thursday. Eleven special teams carried out raids on multiple shops across the commissionerate. The raids, along with Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) officials, were carried out in areas including Poonamallee, Mangadu, Ambattur, Ambattur Industrial Estate and neighbouring areas. This resulted in the confiscation of 46kg gutka and other tobacco products.

ORLD chess champion Velammal's Dommaraju Gukesh was felicitated by Tamil Nadu Chief Minister M K Stalin on Tuesday. The 18-yearold was honoured with a cash award of Rs 5 crore for his stupendous achievement. It was a well deserved reward for becoming the 18th World champion.

The CM also said SDAT will launch a chess academy named the 'Home of Chess'.

Gukesh arrived in his hometown on Monday to a rousing welcome, with his school Velammal Vidyalaya at the forefront. One of his celebrations after making history in Singapore was doing a Bungee Jump along with his main coach Grzegorz Gajewski.

After his intense showdown with Ding Liren, which went to the wire, the Chennaiite said he will not be competing in the World Rapid & Blitz Championship in New York, which is the next big event in the chess calendar. It's understandable that Gukesh requires rest and relaxation to recharge his batteries after his gruelling match.

Pranav Triumphs

Pranav V of Velammal Vidyalaya, Mel Aynambakkam continued his good form, bagging a double in the World Youth (U-18) Rapid & Blitz in Brezice, Slovenia. Pranav clinched the rapid crown (9.5/11) with a round to spare! He followed it by winning the blitz crown (19.5/22) in even more emphatic fashion He performs well in all the formats (classical, rapid & blitz). Playing a lot of online blitz games from a young age has made Pranav one of the



top blitz players in India. Competing regularly in Titled Tuesday (chess.com event) tournaments with the likes of Magnus Carlsen, Hikaru Nakamura and Alireza Firouzja has improved his blitz skills without a doubt.

Illamparthi excels

India's A R Illamparthi, who has been making progress with every tournament, made his second GM norm in the Singapore Open, which was organised as a part of celebrating the World Championship. Illamparthi had a fruitful tournament, finishing eighth with 6.5 points. Gaining 28 rating points, besides having a performance rating of 2688, were the other highlights of his successful campaign.

Arjun joins 2800 club

Arjun Erigaisi, joined the 2800club recently. Arjun had an incredible 2024, winning three tournaments, playing a big part in India bagging Chess Olympiad gold with an individual gold on the third board. He also became India No.1 with his consistent performances. The 21-year-old is in contention for a Candidates spot, occupying the second spot behind Fabiano Caruana in the FIDE Circuit. He has to perform exceptionally well in the World Rapid and Blitz (starts on Dec 26) Championship in New York to earn a spot in the 2026 Candidates. It's a difficult but not impossible if he performs at his best.

TVS Canal to be diverted to **Padikuppam Canal**

THE Greater Chennai Corporation (GCC) has announced plans to divert the TVS canal in Anna Nagar West, a key tributary of the Otteri Nullah, towards the Padikuppam canal before the TVS Lucas factory. This move, part of the city's larger flood mitigation strategy, aims to enhance drainage and reduce flooding risks in the area, particularly during the monsoon season.

The TVS canal, a vital watercourse flowing over two kilometers, carries floodwater through Ambattur Industrial Estate, Kumarasamy Nagar, and Anna Nagar West, eventually joining the Otteri Nullah near the Anna Nagar railway station. The diversion is seen as a precursor to further improvements along the Otteri Nullah, which has long been a flood-prone stretch.

Residents of Anna Nagar, however, have expressed concerns over the narrow diversion channel along 3rd Avenue. They have requested the GCC to address the issue of desilting, which has long been a challenge for the area's drainage system. The Corporation says dredging operations have already been undertaken to remove silt from the Otteri Nullah and the Virugambakkam canal. As of November this year, 1,250 metric tonnes of silt was removed, according to an official.

The dredging operations were done using floaters and Poclain machinery, a form of earth-moving equipment, to clear the accumulated silt. Additionally, a bathymetric study is being carried out in collaboration with IIT Madras to support scientific dredging techniques and further improve the canals' capacity to handle stormwater.

The Federation of Anna Nagar Residents Associations (FOARA) hailed the move of the civic agency. The Otteri Nullah, which was previously

managed by the Water Resources Department (WRD), was transferred to the Greater Chennai Corporation on October 20, 2024. Since the transfer, the Corporation has been implementing both short-term and long-term measures to mitigate flooding risks and improve stormwater management across Anna Nagar and neighbouring areas.

These ongoing efforts are expected to provide significant relief to residents and reduce the risk of flooding in the region, particularly in floodprone areas like Anna Nagar West. In addition, the GCC has taken steps to ensure better drainage and stormwater management by constructing new drains and catch pits. Two new drains have been laid from 4th Main Road and 6th Main Road to a balancing drain that directs water away from Otteri Nullah towards the Cooum river. A curvilinear pathway is also under construction to divert Otteri Nullah's water into the Cooum river, further strengthening the flood mitigation infrastructure, officials said.



Anna Nagar: Chennai's pothole capital

ANNA Nagar, one of Chennai's prominent residential areas, has earned the unenviable title of having the most potholes in the city, according to a recent survey by the Greater Chennai Corporation (GCC). Out of 2,076 damaged road patches identified across Chennai since December 1, Anna Nagar tops the list with 181, followed by Valasaravakkam with 144. This alarming statistic has sparked outrage among residents, who are demanding immediate action.

"It's a nightmare to commute here. Every road feels like an obstacle course," said Meenakshi Raman, a resident of Shanthi Colony. "Despite paying high property taxes, we are left to navigate dangerous potholes that damage vehicles and pose risks to pedestrians."

The GCC has responded to the widespread complaints with a promise to make Chennai a 'potholefree' city within six months. The civic body plans to deploy 15 mobile jet patchwork machines for rapid repairs. These machines, costing ₹50 lakh each, will use a cold mix injection process to fill and compact potholes efficiently.

"Currently, we have four machines in operation and are aiming to allocate one per zone. Tenders for repairs have been issued, and we hope to see significant progress soon," a GCC engineer said.

However, Anna Nagar residents remain skeptical. "We have heard promises before, but nothing changes on the ground," said Palani Kumar, a longtime resident. "The recent rains have only worsened the situation. Roads are filled with gravel and construction debris, making them unsafe for motorists and pedestrians alike."

The issue is not limited to Anna Nagar. Valasaravakkam's Velan Nagar 7th Street residents reported two accidents due to loose gravel and roadside construction material. Similarly, streets in George Town and Kondithope, including NSC Bose Road and Linghi Chetty Street, are riddled with potholes despite recent repairs.

The shift from the traditional hot mix method to the environmentally friendly cold mix process, following the Tamil Nadu Pollution Control Board's ban on hot-mix plants, is a significant step. However, logistical challenges and the high cost of equipment are slowing down implementation.

For Anna Nagar, the stakes are high. "We want accountability," said Priya Venkat, a local activist. "These potholes are not just inconveniences; they are safety hazards. Children walking to school, elderly people crossing roads—everyone is at risk."

As the GCC ramps up its efforts, residents hope the promise of a potholefree Chennai will finally be fulfilled. Until then, they continue to endure bumpy rides and growing frustration.

Schools to open on Jan 2 after break

Extra buses to clear holiday crowd

TO manage the extra rush at bus depots during the Christmas-New Year holiday week, TNSTC will operate special buses alongside routine govt bus services across the state.

Starting this weekend,625 special buses will operate from Chennai to various destinations. Of these, 325 will depart from Kilambakkam, heading to Madurai, Trichy, Coimbatore, Salem, and Tirunelveli. Another 280 buses will leave from Koyambedu over



three days, serving travellers to Tiruvannamalai, Nagapattinam, Velankanni, Hosur, and Bengaluru, according to an official release. With large crowds expected, managers have been deployed at Kilambakkam terminus.

TNSTC has also planned special services to hill stations such as Nilgiris, Kodaikanal, and Yercaud. Previously, Yercaud did not have direct bus connectivity, now there are two buses directly From Chennai and Madurai to Yercaud. Meanwhile, Southern Railway has announced additional special trains for the Christmas season, including the Tuticorin-Madurai-Bengaluru Express, on December 21.
